From our TBHMPC family to yours, we hope that you all have a safe and happy holiday season with the ones who bring you comfort and love.



Important Updates & Resources

COVID-19 Vaccine & Treatment Updates

- **Vaccine Allocation in Florida**—Governor DeSantis rolled out [Florida's allocation plan](#) this week, with residents of long-term care facilities slated as the first population to receive the vaccine, once approved. Following will be healthcare workers in high-risk environments, then people 65 and older and/or those with significant comorbidities. These phases follow the CDC's recommendations. Partnerships have been made with Walgreens and CVS to offer on-site vaccination services in long term care facilities (see conference call notes section for more info).
- **Provider Info re: COVID-19 Vaccine**—In preparation for vaccine availability, the Florida Department of Health is encouraging providers that wish to eventually provide the COVID-19 Vaccine to ensure they are enrolled in Florida SHOTS and Vaccines for Children/Adult (VFC/VFA) Program. More info available [HERE](#).
- **HHS Allocates Regeneron Therapeutic to Treat Patients with Mild to Moderate COVID-19**— On November 24th, HHS began allocating patient courses of Regeneron's investigational monoclonal antibody therapeutic, casirivimab/imdevimab, which received emergency use authorization from the FDA on November 21, for treatment of non-hospitalized patients with mild or moderate confirmed cases of COVID-19 at high risk of hospitalization. HHS will allocate these government-owned patient courses to state and territorial health departments which, in turn, will determine which healthcare facilities receive the infusion drug.
- **HHS Purchases Additional Doses of Eli Lilly Therapeutic**— On December 2nd, the Trump Administration announced the purchase of 650,000 additional treatments courses of Eli Lilly and Co's investigational monoclonal antibody therapeutic, bamlanivimab, to be delivered in December & January for treatment of non-hospitalized COVID-19 patients.

ASPR/FHA COVID Supplemental Funding Opportunity

This past summer, Health Care Coalitions statewide were given an opportunity to receive additional funding to support our long-term care and home health partners. In Tampa Bay, we formed a working group consisting of facility administrators, DOH representatives, and an infection preventionist to recommend ways that funds would have the greatest impact. These 5 areas of focus were identified to direct the funding.

- Training and Education to include, but not limited to; Nursing Home Incident Command (NHICS), Infectious Disease Preparedness Plan development and implementation, Respiratory Protection Program Development, Infection Control & Reducing Transmission in Health Care facilities, PPE Donning/Doffing.
- Increase the capacity for isolation beds within existing facilities and/or as an alternate care site.
- Development of a Regional Strategic PPR Stockpile to address supply chain shortages
- Fit testing Train the trainer program with fit testing equipment to support the region and individual facility respiratory protection programs.
- Ramp up infection control & providing necessary equipment to support these measures.

The working group approved a project on December 3rd to purchase each of our TBHMPC member facilities that qualify for these funds an electrostatic disinfectant sprayer (Emist EPIX 360). We will be reaching out to those member facilities in the coming weeks to arrange training and delivery of your EPIX360 Systems.

As the working group continues to research ways to support your organizations and develop training and educational opportunities, we want to ensure that all relevant members are able to access all the benefits that the Coalition offers its members. PAPR Training with Code Pinke Crisis Planning at AdventHealth Dade City


The Tampa Bay Health & Medical Preparedness Coalition sponsored the first of several OSHA Trainings on PAPRs & PPE for Highly Infectious Disease and Decon on October 29th. A collaboration with Code Pinke Crisis Consulting, this training familiarized students with use of PAPRs in infectious disease and contaminated environments, and gave them first hand practice in donning and doffing critical PPE.

Statewide Conference Calls

State Florida Hospital Association/Hospital Call, 12/0/2020—These calls will once again be occurring weekly, Tuesdays at 10am.

- Dr. Rivkees noted that the first case of COVID-19 was reported in Florida March 1st. As of now we hope to begin vaccinations by as early as mid-December.
- The last 2 weeks the positivity rate has been between 6-9% and the number of new cases has been relatively stable. The current RT value is 1.04% and we need to get that back down below 1% again.
- Dr. Rivkees spoke about the monoclonal antibody treatments available via the Emergency Use Orders.
- Regeneron Pharmaceutical's antibody cocktail REGN-COV2 showing it reduced viral load and the time to alleviate symptoms in non-hospitalized patients with COVID-19. REGN-COV2 also showed positive trends in reducing medical visits.
- Bamlanivimab is an investigational medicine used for the treatment of COVID-19 in non-hospitalized adults and adolescents 12 years of age and older with mild to moderate symptoms who weigh 88 pounds (40 kg) or more, and who are at high risk for developing severe COVID-19 symptoms or the need for hospitalization.
- There are 2 vaccines anticipated to be released soon. It is not clear exactly when and what amounts will be made available in the first release.
- Hospitals are encouraged to identify and prioritize their needs such as staff over 55 or with underlying conditions.
- Over 50 hospitals in the state were identified as having cold storage capacity. Of those 5 were pre-identified for the first phase trial of the rollout.
- AHCA advised we currently have 4400 patients across the state in hospitals with COVID-19. They also noted a steady increase in hospitalizations but not a rapid one like seen earlier this year.
- There are 959 ICU beds occupied with COVID-19 patients & remains 20-30% availability.
- AHCA has added additional questions to their ESS report in reference to staffing.
- Hospitals requested advanced notice of changes to ESS required data.

Healthcare Provider Call in Response to the Coronavirus, 12/03/2020

Emmett Reed, FHCA Executive Director

- Gov. DeSantis announced LTC residents would be a priority and he reiterated that today to me, personally .
- We have returned to a weekly call schedule. Check our website for Christmas week schedule.

State Surgeon General. Dr. Scott Rivkees:

- Protecting residents in LTC facilities remains our priority.
- Increased number of cases recently, but is stabilizing - we must continue to keep a close eye to see if there is an effect after Thanksgiving holiday.
- 150,000 test results were received yesterday: we are monitoring rates carefully.
- Again, this is a virus that can be spread by those who are asymptomatic and pre-symptomatic, which is why we have to be vigilant with mitigation measures. Mask wearing at all times and handwashing remain critically important. Screen employees, staff and visitors. Use hand sanitizer and emphasize hand washing.
- CDC said you may shorten the quarantine periods for individuals who have tested negative after an exposure. Note: this may not apply to LTCFs. We have sought additional guidance from the CDC but follow rules you have been following until otherwise informed.
- Symptomatic clients who are not on oxygen may qualify for monoclonal antibodies. Reach out to local hospitals who may have set up infusion centers. In some cases, home health agencies may administer.

- Vaccination: tremendous amount of info in media. Appears Pfizer will be the first out and Moderna will be reviewed by FDA on Dec. 17.
- HHS gives out info by the day. You can start helping by thinking about how to identify those individuals you want vaccinated. Initially, it will be residents of nursing homes, followed by staff. Create rosters now, identify those who can give consent on their own and those who need a conservator. More info coming but this is tremendous for those in your care.

Walgreens/ Sally West, Government Relations:

- Echo Dr. Rivkee's statement about coordinating consent paperwork. Ensure it is filled out and signed before we arrive at your facility so we can vaccinate as many people as possible.
- In Florida, we are partnering with just under 2,000 facilities. Once the CDC gives us the final go-ahead, we will contact each facility to schedule a vaccination clinic.
- Also working with DEM to ensure our vaccinators will be tested prior to arrival at facilities.
- Will be working out of the EOC so we have close contact with Dr. Rivkees, AHCA, Strike Teams and DEM's Director Moskowitz.
- We believe the earliest to expect us would be December 21, but may be in flux.

CVS, Brooke Kleiner

- Will work with roughly 1800 Skilled Nursing Facilities and ALFs. Coordinating closely with Walgreen's, state and federal agencies
- Echo importance of determining rosters and knowing how to get consent

Q and A for CVS/Walgreen's:

- Q, Should facilities develop their own form or will CDC have some? A. No – the form is specific and being developed by others. The facility should not develop their own. Walgreen's and CDC will provide those, when ready
- Q. Will you provide facilities with a checklist for setting up a vaccination clinic? A. Yes.

Secretary Shavaun Harris, AHCA:

- Seeing a slight decline in cases in past 3-4 days
- Two emergency rules issued by AHCA earlier this week. One requires licensed LTCFs to participate in the Pharmacy Partnership, which allows for vaccination. The Survey Monkey closes tonight at 11:59 pm. AHCA has been calling facilities, but this is a requirement.
- ESS has been updated and questions related to PPE tracking have been added. This will help us analyze and track the volume of use. Ensure you fill this out.
- Stay the course: we require our staff to conduct virtual visits to minimize the flow of traffic in/out of facilities. We will revisit this in early 2021.
- Vaccination Planning: it is critical from a logistics perspective to figure out where vaccine clinics will be taking place. Start calling residents to determine interest and families if their signature is needed.
- A vaccine playbook is being developed to help us vaccinate the greatest number of people expeditiously. We will share that when ready for dissemination.

AHCA Chief of Field Operations, Kim Smoak

- Reminder: If you're installing barriers or other modifications to your physical plant in response to cases on site, you should submit a plans modification review request. That's because this can impact sprinklers, exits and walkways. File those to the Office of Planning and Construction and reach out with any questions.

FHCA: CDC will share communications tools soon and we will pass those along to you

Deborah Franklin, Sr. Director of Quality Affairs, FHCA:

- 1135 waiver still in effect by CMS. If a hospital reaches out and says they have a 3-day waiver, know what that means. This should remain in effect till January
- On our CoVID page: update from CDC on optimizing facemask supply. Please review and remain in compliance with all the categories including crisis compliance

Next call: December 10, 2020: returning to a weekly schedule starting next week.
